



Smart in everything BUT school?

Every parent wants their child to be successful in school. But as many as 25% of children in each classroom have vision problems that keep them from attaining their highest level of success. Four of five classroom hours involve doing near vision work less than arm's length from a child's eyes. Many children and adults cannot handle such intense, prolonged near vision work.

Do you recognize any of these symptoms?

- Short attention span for reading
- Must read and re-read material to understand it well
- Takes "hours" to do 30 minutes of homework
- Disturbs other children in class during reading or other subjects that require intense near work
- Gets sleepy when reading
- Still reverses words, letters or numbers beyond second grade
- Better at math than English
- Skips or re-reads words or lines
- Covers one eye while reading, exhibits odd postures at desk
